This past year, we've made meaningful progress in each of these areas. We've strengthened community safety by investing in emergency services, community supports, and neighbourhood policing. We've continued to invest in parks, libraries, recreation facilities, and community spaces that residents rely on every day. We've worked to make life more affordable by expanding programs for seniors, students, homeowners, and small businesses. And we've made transportation improvements that help keep people moving across our city.

This progress is made possible by our incredibly engaged community. This year, my office has assisted thousands of residents with local concerns and engaged with you through consultations, community meetings, and local events. From Summer Celebration to our Seniors Town



Halls, Condo Clinic, Community Safety Town Halls, Youth Jobs Fair, Environment Days, and other local events, we've stayed connected to ensure you and your neighbours' voices are reflected in the decisions that shape our neighbourhoods.

This newsletter shares updates on the work underway and investments being made across Don Valley North to build a safer, more affordable, and better-connected community.

Keeping Our Neighbourhoods Safe



Community safety is built through strong emergency services, meaningful community partnerships, and ongoing engagement with residents. By listening to local concerns, investing in frontline services, and supporting community-based solutions, we are strengthening neighbourhoods across Toronto and ensuring residents feel supported, connected, and safe where they live, work, and travel.

As Chair of the Toronto Police Services Board, I worked closely with the Police Chief to implement the Multi-Year Hiring Plan, which is hiring hundreds of new officers every year to address staffing shortages, improve service, and enhance safety. These investments are delivering results, with declines in major crime including homicides, auto thefts, robberies, and break-ins, and improvements in police response times.

Safety Improvements Snapshot

Opening the Fairview Community Safety Hub: Created a new hub to support youth outreach and stronger police-neighbourhood relationships in the Fairview area.

Expanding Neighbourhood Community Officers (NCOs): We are deploying police NCO teams on Line 1 to make transit safer, and increasing the number of NCOs in our local division.

Tackling Hate: Launched "Toronto for All", a public education campaign that provides resources to Toronto residents to foster belonging and combat antisemitism and Islamophobia across our city.

Strengthening Trust in Policing: Launched independent inspections into corruption and police culture, while advancing new measures to strengthen accountability, transparency, and public confidence in policing.

Investing in Safer, Better-Lit Streets: Modernizing aging streetlights across the city to keep local streets, sidewalks, and public spaces welcoming and accessible.

Growing Community Crisis Response Services: Piloting a community-led crisis response program on the TTC that connects persons in distress with trained crisis workers and community resources.

Advancing SafeTO: Expanding youth outreach, mentorship, violence prevention, and community supports through Toronto's ten-year Community Safety Plan.

Investing in Our Communities



Strong communities are built through steady, thoughtful investment in the places people rely on every day, from recreation spaces to local infrastructure and community hubs. Across **Pleasant View, Brian Village, and Consumers**, these projects include Participatory Budgeting projects chosen directly by residents, improvements advocated for by my office, and state-of-good-repair upgrades. Together, they strengthen local services, protect neighbourhood assets, and improve quality of life for residents of all ages.

Making Life More Affordable

Each year, I hear directly about the pressures households are facing and your budget priorities through pre-budget consultations, town halls, and conversations. That feedback shapes how we invest responsibly and fairly across Toronto. The following investments reflect what I've heard from our community. They focus on keeping more money in your pocket while improving quality of life across our city.

Affordability Snapshot

Delivering the New Deal for Toronto: The New Deal secured major provincial funding and eased property tax pressure for City investments and infrastructure projects.

Cleaning Up Toronto's Books: Uncovered \$788 million in savings to ensure better value for your tax dollars, and secured the City's first credit rating increase in decades, delivering tens of millions of dollars in construction savings.

Cutting Red Tape: Created a Red Tape Hotline to remove barriers for new businesses and build affordable housing.

Supporting Small Businesses: Delivered a 5% property tax reduction for over 28,000 local businesses.

Growing Student Food Programs: Providing nutritious meals to more schools, supporting families, and improving student well-being across Toronto.

Infrastructure Investments Snapshot

North York General Hospital's Long-Term Care Expansion: Partnering with North York General to speed up the creation of a 528-bed long-term care facility that will provide high-quality, safe, and dignified seniors' care.

Muirhead Park New Shade Structure: Participatory Budgeting delivered a long-awaited shade structure, providing sun protection and improving comfort for park users.

Clydesdale Park Playground Enhancement: Clydesdale Park was upgraded through the Playground Enhancement Program, adding accessible play equipment, new surfacing, and clubhouse improvements, creating a more inclusive and welcoming space for children of all ages and abilities.

Pleasant View Library Renovation and Expansion: Construction is underway to transform Pleasant View Library into a modern, fully-accessible 10,000 sq. ft. community hub with flexible spaces, new digital tools, and barrier-free design for all ages.



Expanding Air Conditioner Assistance: Now permanent, this program provides up to 2400 free air conditioning units in 2026 to seniors and other residents who are vulnerable to extreme heat events.

Opening Libraries Seven Days a Week: All Toronto Public Library branches are now open on Sundays, expanding free access to books, technology, study spaces, and programs.

Expanding Supports for Seniors: Investing in home care, cleaning assistance, and financial services to help older adults live independently.

Helping Homeowners Prevent Basement Flooding: Expanded subsidies to help homeowners prevent damage to their properties, reduce costs, and become more resilient against increasingly severe weather events.

Getting People Moving



Our city depends on reliable transportation networks that help people get where they need to go safely, efficiently, and affordably. Across Don Valley North, we continue to hear about congestion, travel delays, and the need for more predictable commutes. That feedback is shaping action at City Hall and in our neighbourhoods. By investing in roads, modern traffic management tools, active transportation, and transit, we are improving mobility across Toronto while responding to the everyday transportation challenges we experience in our community.

Mobility Improvements Snapshot

Accelerating the Gardiner Expressway Rehabilitation: This project is 18 months ahead of schedule, improving travel times and reducing disruption.

Expanding Smart Traffic Signal Technology: Smart traffic signals on Steeles Avenue East and West adjust in real time to improve flow, reduce delays, and enhance travel times.

Freezing TTC Fares While Improving Service: TTC fares are frozen for a third year, while investments improve subway infrastructure, accessibility, safety, and reliability.

Implementing Toronto's Congestion Management Plan: The new Congestion Management Plan invests in traffic flow, coordinated construction, stronger transit, and new technology to reduce delays citywide.

Advancing Traffic Agent Deployment: This expanded program deploys traffic agents at key congestion points and reviews suburban intersections to improve traffic flow.

Expanding Bike Share in Don Valley North: New stations support active transportation and connect to transit.
